

Diseases and Conditions Reported to Colorado Public Health Agencies by State Law

Important notice for patients receiving health care services in Colorado:

The following list of diseases and conditions must be reported to state or county public health agencies by health care providers, hospitals and laboratories, according to Colorado Board of Health regulations (<http://www.cdphe.state.co.us/op/regs/diseasecontrol/index.html>). By law, this reporting does not require patient consent or notification. The confidentiality of personal health information reported to the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) is protected by law. If you have questions about whether you might have a condition that must be reported, discuss this with your health care provider.

Legionnaires' disease	Animal bites
Leprosy	Autism spectrum disorders (≤ 10 years old)
Listeria	Biological, chemical or radioactive bioterrorism conditions
Lyme disease	Birth defects, developmental disabilities (DD) and DD risk factors (pregnancy to 3 rd birthday)
Lymphogranuloma venereum	Blood lead levels (> 25 ug/dl and all < 18 years old)
Malaria	Blood mercury (> 0.5 ug/dl, urine > 20 ug/l)
Measles	Fetal alcohol syndrome (≤ 10 years old)
Meningitis (viral)	Head injuries (hospitalized or fatal)
Meningococcal disease	Muscular Dystrophy
Methicillin-resistant Staph aureus (invasive)*	Spinal cord injuries
