

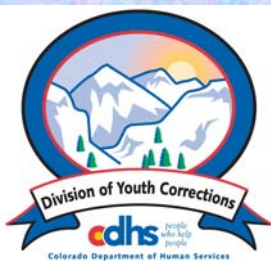

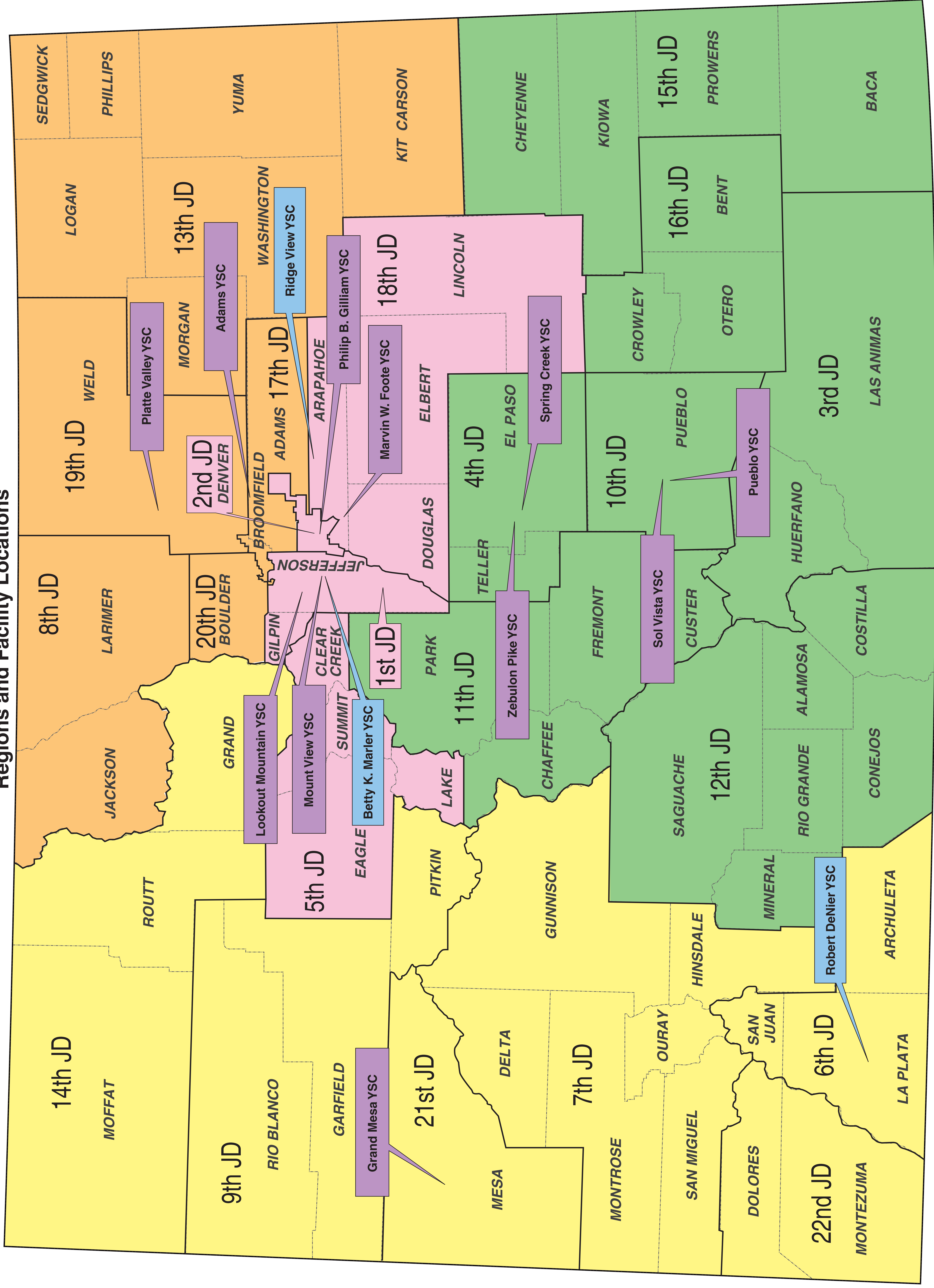

Program Overview:

SPRTC is a staff secure, JACHO accredited adolescent residential program providing 24-hour care in an intensive, highly structured treatment environment. At SPRTC we treat behavioral, mental health and substance abuse problems, applying accepted "best practices" to help our young client's progress through their issues. We incorporate gender specific educational programming, Dialectical Behavior Therapy, relapse prevention, anger management, trauma intervention and additional professional mental health services to optimize the delivery of treatment. In addition, SPRTC promotes an understanding of abiding by the Seven Key Principals for healthy community living to both youth and staff. The Seven Key Principles include: People Security, Program Security, Accountability, Responsibilities & High Expectations, Teamwork & Communication, Role Modeling, Dignity & Respect and Cleanliness of Environment of Care. These Seven Key Principles also provide the foundation for the youth to both advance through the phase system and begin to actively demonstrate pro-social behavior on a daily basis. Ultimately acquiring the skills needed for successful transition.

Positive Behavior Support (PBS): SPRTC has adopted PBS and RISE Program as an integral part of the school day which promotes a common approach to discipline, positively stated expectations for all students and staff, procedures for teaching these expectations to students, a continuum of procedures for encouraging demonstration and maintenance of these expectations, a continuum of procedures for discouraging rule-violating behavior and procedures for monitoring and evaluating the effectiveness of the discipline system on a regular and frequent basis.

RISE cards are issued to promote positive behavior. Youth and staff are issued a RISE card when they are “caught doing something right”, weekly drawings are conducted with prizes offered. In addition, SPRTC offers vocational training which includes taking graduates off campus into the community to work on community beautification programs. Youth are provided with the opportunity to work on community projects such as the U.S. Forest Service, local zoo and homeless shelters. Vocational training also includes coursework in transitional career skills and on-grounds classes for gardening, woodworking and janitorial skills.

Program Overview:

Alternative Homes for Youth has been working with abused, neglected, underserved, high needs youth (and their families) since 1976. AHFY is a not-for-profit state-licensed mental health treatment organization dedicated to helping youth and their families find new hope and opportunity. We are a violence and victim intervention and prevention program, working with the community from a variety of angles. We have a mentoring and tracking program for adolescents involved with the Division of Youth Corrections. We conduct Community-Based Therapy, as well as in-home therapy. On a residential level, we have a treatment center for male youth who have been abused, abusive and traumatized. We also provide independent living services and opportunities. AHFY is an approved Medicaid provider. Our campus-based education programs, including special education and individualization, are approved by the Colorado Department of Education.

Education Services:

AHFY operates an on-ground educational program approved by the Colorado Department of Education. The regular school year runs nine months and includes summer school. The students receive instruction for 216 days, 6 hours a day, five days a week. Currently, we adhere to the Weld County District 6 school calendar. Our facility is divided into two units. The North Unit is for 14-17 year olds and the South Unit is for 18-20 year olds. There is one classroom for each of the units. Currently, when we receive a new admission, we request their transcripts from their last district school of attendance as well as any other past placements. We use the MBA, which is the shortened version of the Woodcock Johnson, as a pre and post test, to determine grade growth and address their functioning levels in math, reading and writing. We discuss with the student their educational goals regarding high school graduation or obtaining a GED. If the student chooses to work on completing classes for credits for their High School Diploma, a transcript analysis is performed to determine what credits are needed to obtain their diploma. We then tailor their educational time accordingly. We use the graduation requirements as adopted for Weld County, District 6.

Additionally we partner we other programs providing ancillary services to youth in placement, e.g. DAYS accepts sex offenders but treatment services would have to be through a community offense specific program.

Program Overview:

The program at GMYSC entails an integrated approach of the Peace for Kids curriculum and encompasses the milieu, education, treatment and family relationships. All programs operate under a consistent safety and security umbrella, utilizing a Positive Peer Culture. Every resident participates in Goal Groups, Victim Awareness, Passive Recreation, Large Muscle Activity (above and beyond a regular physical education program), Social Awareness Groups, Life Skills Groups, Team Feedback Group, Orientation Groups and Voluntary Religious Services and AA Groups. Each resident has a unit advocate that is a liaison between the youth and staff. Each resident also has access to opportunities with Restorative Community Justice, Vocational Training, Dog Training and for students who have reached the highest program level they have the opportunity to participate in structured activities in the community.

Education Services:

Grand Mesa's State School operates year round and is licensed and accredited by the State of Colorado. The school serves a student population from the Western Slope consisting of thirty-four school districts. This comprehensive academic program includes all core subjects, fine arts and a strong transition/vocational component. Students are able to gain their High School Diploma through Mesa County Valley School District 51. School-to-work skills are embedded throughout the curriculum for both post secondary and non-post secondary students. Individual Education Plans are closely followed to insure success for students with special needs. Students are valued for the strengths they bring with them and encouraged to work on those areas needed for them to succeed. The consistent message all students receive is the importance of becoming life long learners and of healthy personal growth. They are empowered, equipped and encouraged to become positive, contributing members of society.

Treatment Services:

GMYSO employs four full time mental health therapists as well as one part-time family therapist. Each committed youth participates in a thorough psychosocial assessment and then is placed in groups and individual therapy. Every youth is seen by a therapist at least once a week, and usually participates in numerous groups throughout the day. Treatment groups include: Offense Specific for Sex Offenders, Drug and Alcohol Treatment, Education Groups, Trauma Group, Anger Management, Parenting Groups for Young Parents and for the Parents of Committed Youth, Gender Specific Groups and all residents participate in the Peace for Kids curriculum.

Program Overview:

Guided by the goal of residents being prepared to successfully re-enter Colorado communities, LMYSC's mission is to promote positive change through holistic treatment programming. Normative Culture, a peer based behavioral management system focuses on student and staff accountability and leadership. Restorative Community Justice allows students the opportunity to practice the RCJ principles and learn how to repair harm, reduce risk and rebuild the community.

Education Services:

Students, through an on-grounds partnership with the Community College of Denver, are involved in six hours per day of academic and/or vocational education. During assessment a youth's academic skills and needs are determined, these form the basis for his Individual Education Plan. Depending on his age, capabilities and interests, a youth may work toward a GED or High School Diploma, may take regular or remedial classes in preparation for his return to public school, or may enroll in a post-secondary program. In vocational classes, youth learn entry-level trade skills and positive work habits. Current vocational offerings include: Culinary Arts, Electronics, Silk Screening, Printing and Reprographics, Construction Trades and Custodial Services.

Treatment Services:

Treatment groups specific to offenses, family dynamics, mental health challenges and drug and alcohol treatment are delivered to all students based on their Individualized Treatment Plan. Thinking for a Change, a cognitive behavioral curriculum developed by the National Institute of Corrections, is required for all students. Through a partnership established between the Division of Youth Corrections and Devereux Cleo Wallace, services for mentally ill youth at LMYSC have been enhanced through provision of psychiatric consultation, evaluation, research and direct care. Recreation, intramurals, music, art, religious programming, varsity sports and many other therapeutic pro-social activities offer students the opportunities to identify areas of interest and skill to take with them as they develop healthy lifestyles.

We also serve as the assessment center for the Northeast Region; for both female and male newly committed youth. Program Overview:

Sol Vista Youth Services Center provides a secure, highly specialized 20-bed mental health treatment facility for juveniles with severe mental health needs committed to the Division of Youth Corrections for violent offenses, including family problems, physical and sexual abuse, substance abuse, depression, mental health (Axis I) diagnosis and violent behaviors. The LOS for these residents is between 12-18 months. Sol Vista is a multi-agency partnership between the Division of Youth Corrections (DYC) and the Colorado Mental Health Institute of Pueblo (CMHIP). The goal of this partnership is to develop a continuum of highly specialized research-based strategies to achieve measurable outcomes, while promoting individual accountability and assuring public safety. Sol Vista Youth Services Center is designed, and staffed appropriately to provide the safest environment possible for staff and residents. Specific staff training in the Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) was provided and will be utilized to effectively deal with this unique type of client. Targets are addressed in a hierarchical manner and address the Discrete Care Plan provided by each residents Client Manager in conjunction with supplemental assessment conducted upon entry to Sol Vista.

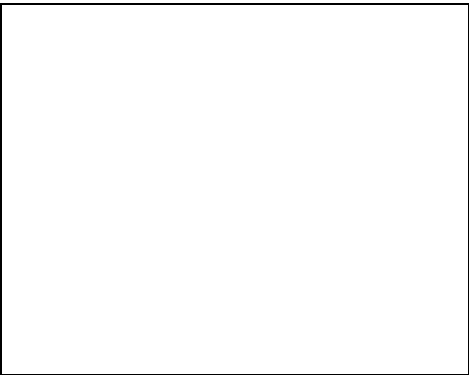
Education Services:

Sol Vista Academy provides for a fully accredited high school addressing educational abilities and deficiencies for grades K through 12. The Colorado Department of Education (CDE) currently certifies the Principal for K through 12 and all educational staff are certified and are Highly Qualified (NCLB Federal Guidelines) in their respective subjects. The school currently offers CDE standardized curriculum in Language Arts, Social Studies, Mathematics, Information Technology and General Science, in addition to Transition Classes, Skill Groups and GED preparation. Articulation agreements are being developed between Pueblo Community College, and School Districts 60 and 70 to provide High School Diplomas as accomplished and community college entrance testing for continuity of care programs and GED testing. Additional vocational models are under development, as well as the expansion of academic offerings. The school meets or exceeds all CDE Special Education requirements.

Treatment Services:

The treatment goal of Sol Vista is to stabilize residents for future placement opportunities through skills training. Resident's are exposed to a Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) treatment model. Residents receive DBT Skills Training, Offense Specific Treatment, Sex Offense Specific Treatment, Drug and Alcohol Counseling, Family Therapy, Individual Therapy, Psychological Diagnostic Services, and On-Site Psychiatric Services. Diagnostic testing is conducted within facility. Resident's receive an intensive risk assessment upon their arrival at Sol Vista to determine their treatment targets and the focus of their Individualized Treatment Plan.

Spring Creek Youth Services Center (SCYSC) is just one of the Division of Youth Corrections multi-purpose, state-operated facilities. SCYSC is a 100-bed facility that provides a secure detention, assessment and treatment facility for the Southern Region of Colorado. The primary purpose of the facility is to provide detention services for El Paso, Park and Teller counties, and to provide treatment services for the Southern Region. In addition, the facility serves as a regional assessment/treatment center. In this capacity, the facility serves twenty-two counties in Southern Colorado. Youth housed in the facility range in age from 10 to 17.

Education Services:

Educational services at SCYSC are provided by District Eleven. The traditional curriculum at SCYSC is standards-based and targets established School District Eleven content areas. Our education program fosters an environment in which at-risk youth can experience success by focusing on achievement in basic academic and prevocational skills. Colorado Springs School District Eleven Standards, Benchmarks and Indicators serve as a guideline for student expectations and achievements. We believe enabling students to construct concepts using prior knowledge, as a base will facilitate the learning process. Students need to explore and discover ideas in ways which encourage internalization and ownership of the learning. When this process becomes the focus in learning, students are empowered to apply knowledge and skills to new situations, a must for a successful transition to the real world.

Treatment Services:

The treatment program at SCYSC utilizes a number of evidence-based curriculums: Aggressive Replacement Therapy by Goldstein, Glick and Gibbs. Dialectical Behavior Therapy by Lineham. We also use Pathways by Milkman and Wanberg for our substance abuse program and Pathways by Kahn for our sexual offender program.

Program Overview:

Zebulon Pike Youth Services Center (ZPYSC) is a 40-bed secure treatment facility under the Division of Youth Corrections. As a secure facility, ZPYSC accepts youth from 12-20 years of age who may have substance abuse issues, sexual offending behaviors, and/or committed a violent crime or property offense. Approximately 1/3 of our population are youth age 15 and under. ZPYSC understands that to assist our youth in becoming “tomorrow’s achievers” we must provide a safe and secure environment. To ensure this, staff are well versed in providing each youth clear directions and appropriate consequences or rewards. Upon arrival, every youth reviews the resident handbook with staff that clearly outlines the program, rules and responsibilities. All youth have the opportunity to participate in school, treatment and recreation. An Individualized Treatment Plan is developed during the first 30 days of admission. The three phases of the program are modeled to address each youth’s criminogenic needs, developmental level and emotional status, working toward enhancing strengths (protective factors) and decreasing deficits (risk factors). Cognitive-behavioral in nature, the program employs the concepts of Rational Behavior Therapy (RBT), Aggression Replacement Training (ART), Thinking for a Change (T4C) and Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT). To instill a team approach, multi-disciplinary team meetings are imperative and occur each Wednesday. Family involvement is strongly encouraged through individual and multi-family therapy. We offer a variety of faith-based opportunities. Youth for Christ, Nicki Cruz Ministries and Pat Cooperrider all visit the facility each week. All participation in these activities is strictly voluntary. A youth may request a visit from a personal faith-based counselor.

Education Services:

ZPYSC offers an on-site licensed and accredited education program that includes classroom instruction on all core subjects, GED preparation, business management, vocational programs and transition activities. Throughout the year, education classes are scheduled 5 days per week, between the hours of 7:50 am and 2:20 pm. School-to-work skills are embedded throughout the curriculum and Individual Education Plans are implemented for youth with special needs. Woodcock Johnson-II is administered to students to assess their individualized education needs. Post-secondary education programs are an option for

eligible students. Vocational programs include housekeeping and culinary arts. To recognize achievement and maintain family involvement, parent/teacher conferences and award ceremonies are scheduled quarterly, while graduation services are held twice per year.

Treatment Services:

ZPYSC offers treatment and prevention level substance abuse intervention to all youth in need; Certified Addiction Counselors facilitate these groups using the Pathways Curriculum. In partnership with a community center, the next step for treatment level youth includes in-house advanced substance abuse groups focused on relapse prevention and preparation for transition. These residents then begin to attend aftercare groups in the community in the weeks just prior to parole. "Bridging the Gap", this step-down program helps support our youth maintain abstinence upon release. We follow the Sex Offender Management Board's recommendations to meet best practices for treatment of youth who have sexually offended. First, a physically and psychologically safe environment for treatment must be established. Next, treatment focuses on building communication skills, increasing empathy and taking accountability. Abusive interactions are defined and healthy relating practiced. Recognition and disruption of the cycle of abuse is outlined prior to youth being released on parole. Safety planning helps ensure safety of the community during transition and prevention of re-offending. We provide structured, scheduled treatment services program in a "safe" environment. Treatment services are provided on a daily basis and as needed; services include: Counseling and mental health intervention under the supervision of a Licensed Clinical Social Worker. Sex offender services are SOMB approved and informed supervision is assigned for each shift; substance abuse treatment is provided twice per week, by contracted Level II and Level III Certified Addiction Counselors. We also staff a registered nurse, thereby providing medical services on a daily basis. Other treatment services include cognitive-behavioral process groups standardized to the "Misuse of Power" curriculum of which all staff is trained. We recognize that the minimum of 90 days transition time before the youth is discharged. The transition can be visiting the youth's home on incremental passes, going to work off-campus, going to school off-campus or a combination of all of the above. We encourage community partners to visit the youth in our facility to form a relationship prior to the youth's discharge. We also recognize that even with a slow and well-planned transition a youth may lapse into old thinking and behavior. If the youth needs an opportunity to refocus he may return to the Spring Creek Youth Services Center (SCYSC) program, which has the same cognitive-behavioral program as ZPYSC. The return to SCYSC will give the youth an opportunity to "tune up" the cognitive distortions that were getting in his way of successful transition.

Commitment, Honor, Achievement and New Growth Experiences

Boys with emotional and behavioral problems are provided an opportunity to learn new skills for successful living. Emphasis is placed on changing self-defeating thinking and behaviors through providing repeated opportunities for success and new learning. The youth are assigned to treatment groups according to individual needs. Group, family and individual therapy focuses on healthy growth experiences. The therapeutic milieu is fully integrated with clinical and educational services and provides mentoring, teaching and coaching to help the residents in achieving a resolution to their problems.

Education Services:

El Pueblo...an Adolescent Treatment Community operates a year-round Day Treatment Program, which is approved by the Colorado Department of Education. Students receive 6 hours of educational programming daily, Monday through Friday. Students are assessed upon admission and develop either a Personalized Learning Plan (PLP) or an Individualized Education Plan (IEP). Student's work at their own level and pace in classrooms where licensed and certified teachers instruct utilizing differentiated instruction. El Pueblo addresses the student's instructional and social/behavioral needs in the educational setting.

El Pueblo offers on-site GED preparation classes, which are designed to help students enhance their reading, math, writing, social studies, science, the arts and other skills necessary to pass the GED examination. SPIRIT PROGRAM (FEMALE PROGRAM):

Self, Pride, Integrity, Resiliency and Independence Training

The SPIRIT Program is a female's program which creates a gender specific environment by focusing on physical safety, emotional safety and single gender programming. Recreational and leisure activity is provided that is specific to girls' interests. The therapeutic cottages are girls' only settings and a separate wing of the on-grounds school that is designated for the girls. This provides females with time, the environment and permission to work on overcoming a value system that appears to favor males. Programming focuses on girls' strengths and develops their social support systems and skills. Program Overview:

Griffith Center's Larkspur program is located on 100-acres in a rural setting midway between Colorado Springs and Denver. We provide residential treatment to boys aged 10-21 years old. We specialize in providing treatment to residents with mental health and behavioral disorders as well as sex offense specific treatment for non-violent offenders. Griffith Centers emphasizes a client-centered, strength-based, collaborative effort in treating the client. Individual, group and family therapy is available on a weekly basis. Each client receives an Individualized Treatment Plan designed by his treatment team, which includes the family and referring party. Non-traditional therapeutic techniques such as ropes, wilderness and equine therapies are used to enhance and to help accelerate the treatment process. Many of our residents are referred for offense-specific treatment. We offer a non-denominational spiritual program that is open to all residents on a voluntary basis. Residents live in rustic lodges and are assigned to their lodge based on age and type of referral. We have a staff-secure unit available for residents requiring a temporary secure treatment setting. We provide community-based services that our residents may access as they prepare to transition into the community. Family preservation and outpatient family services can be activated to assist a youth in their transition home. Residents may transfer into Griffith Center's Independent Living Program or Group Home. We have a part-time psychiatrist on the treatment team and full-time medical staff. All staff are trained in the use of restorative justice principals which are utilized routinely with residents.

Education Services:

Our on-site school is fully accredited and contains a library, computer center and access to vocational education and experiential programs. The school offers full academic instruction in all core subjects with licensed special education teachers. The teachers are supported by specially trained Teacher's Assistants. Griffith Center's school offers Title I instruction in math and literacy. Our school has demonstrated excellence in helping students make up academic work and return to the community prepared for success in a public school setting.

Treatment Services:

Our program provides weekly individual and family therapy for all of our residents. Therapy groups are offered daily with at least 3 groups per week run by a Master's Level therapist. We emphasize personal responsibility and accountability in our treatment approach. Cognitive-Behavioral strategies are utilized to help residents heal from past trauma and to develop a positive sense of self through healthy relationships. Family therapy is an emphasis for all our clients. We strive to develop positive working relationships with all families from the point of admission through discharge. Our programs are linked with Griffith Centers Colorado Springs program, which offers independent living, and group home settings and Chins Up program which offers family preservation and in-home services.

Program Overview:

The Brown Center will accept youth from any district, however preference will be given to those youth who are from the 7th Judicial District to better serve them and their families, ensuring an easier transition back into their community. The Brown Center is designed to serve youth who are recently committed to DYC with medium to low cell scores, have met offense specific treatment needs, are seeking public school and/or employment opportunities in the Montrose area, seek to transition/emancipate to the 7th Judicial District, require a less secure placement as defined in their CJRA/DCP, are currently on parole status and warrant removal from the community, or are to be held in detention/predisposition. Programming is individualized to meet the varied levels of functioning and needs presented by each youth and their family. The program is focused on offering clients the skills necessary for them to transition from a secure setting to a lower level of care, parole home or to independent living.

Education Services:

The Brown Center youth will attend 30 hours of schooling per week (6hours a day, 5 days a week) on a year round schedule. The education program meets all applicable Colorado Department of Education Standards as well as DYC policies and procedures. The program is designed to meet the needs of both special education students as well as non-special education students, and is administered by licensed teachers working in conjunction with Montrose School District special education personnel. Teacher to student ratios are never more than 1 to 12 and have the assistance of daytime Youth Coaches. Brown Center youth that are eligible may attend public school as they begin their transition to a lower level of care. Delivery of educational content is varied and based on the belief that students have many different learning styles. No matter what the student's educational level or learning style, the school program focuses on teaching and nurturing their ability to "learn to learn". A learning plan is developed for each student that enters the Brown Center. Each student's learning plan is individualized and designed to build on the unique strengths of that student, as well as remediation of their weaknesses. These

plans are either an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) for special education students or an Individualized Learning Plan (ILP) for non-special education students. Each plan contains measurable outcomes to monitor student progress and is based on the student's learning style, his educational history, his vocational history and his plan for the future. For youth who already have GED, High School Diploma or who's DCP indicates that they need to primarily pursue pre-employment skills; their ILP is reflective of this. These youth may receive instruction to prepare them to take college entrance exams or enter the workforce if community access has been approved.

Treatment Services:

Because the Brown Center is a RCCF, family counseling services are facilitated through community resources such as Midwestern Colorado Mental Health Center or through contractors specializing in family preservation or multi-systemic therapy. We offer space at the facility to conduct these sessions or will provide transportation for the youth to a designated area. Youth and the family are scheduled for an intake assessment with a licensed professional and placed with the most appropriate counselor/therapist. Services are comprehensive, coordinated and individualized. Treatment plans are developed based on a client's strengths, challenges and resources. A client's family and/or support system are included in each stage of treatment. Services are sensitive to cultural diversity and developing healthy independence for each youth. The Brown Center offers a highly structured daily schedule. Programming for each youth includes a level system and a point system that are used as tools to engage the youth in their individual treatment plans, measure their progress, and reward them for their efforts. The climate at Jackie Reynolds School allows for very positive student and teacher interaction. While it is very structured, it is not too restrictive to those students making positive choices. In the classrooms the teachers use a wide variety of teaching modalities to maximize student learning. Many classes are highly individualized while still providing an atmosphere highly conducive to student learning. Encouraged by positive peer culture and staff supervision, the environment is safe, non-threatening, and lends itself well to learning academic as well as social skills. At 8:00 am school starts with two gatherings; one with the boys and one with the girls. This is the beginning of our affective education class. It is based on the Aggression Replacement Therapy (A.R.T.) curriculum. The rest of the day is divided into eight periods in which the students attend classes in language arts, math, science, social studies, reading, life skills and physical education. If the students are 17 and at

risk for not meeting graduation requirements, they may work on the GED with a tutor who comes from Northeastern Junior College. Classes are scheduled from 8:00 am to 3:15 pm Monday through Thursday, and 8:00 am through 12:05 pm on Friday. The year is divided into four nine-week periods. The students are placed in groups based on such factors as age, developmental maturity, and sometimes compatibility. Students range from 8 to 18 in age. This results in classes that must operate with a wide range of abilities. The classes have to be individualized completely or differentiated to meet the needs of all students. Students also come and go at all times of the year. This increases a need for a flexible curriculum in order to allow for our continually changing population as well as the diverse needs of all our students. Our special education program is a full inclusion model. All classes are modified and adapted to meet the needs of the individual student, special ed. or not. Special education students all have IEPs which contain their individual academic goals. Regular education students have specifically written individual academic goals as well. The teachers educationally document on all students. The staff works to provide educational experiences that maintain and improve academic, intellectual and social functioning. Most of our special education students primarily have a SIED eligibility. The large number of SIED students in our school necessitates the need for an extensive affective curriculum which continually addresses the problem solving and decision-making needs of our students.

Treatment Planning: Within 72 hours of arriving, every resident is assessed by a clinician to determine any immediate or emergency needs. Within 10 days, the resident receives an ICSP. A detailed Individual Case Service Plan guides the care and treatment of each resident. This includes an unlocked 20-bed Therapeutic Residential Child Care Facility (TRCCF) that serves male youth referred by the Division of Youth Corrections and a 12-bed co-ed detention facility. The SLVYC building was designed to effectively maximize the monitoring of youth and enhance a therapeutic environment. A high level of supervision is a part of the program safety. Well-trained and supervised staff creates the basis for managing residents in a safe and caring manner.

Education Services:

San Luis Valley Youth Center strives to provide youth with individualized education services, enabling them to gain the education necessary to successfully return to the public school system, to obtain a diploma, obtain a GED, pursue post secondary opportunities or to enter vocational/technical schools. We hope to insure well-motivated life-long learners who will leave the program and are able to transition to the community successfully. The SLVYC educational program is approved by the Colorado Department of Education. The youth receive six hours of instruction daily including lunch and physical education. The staff ratio is one to eight or two to twelve. There are two teachers in the classroom. Teacher requirements: Masters Level in special education and licensed. There is a Title 1 tutor and a teacher aide in the classroom as well.

Treatment Services:

San Luis Valley Youth Center recognizes that mental health services are essential to the effective operation of the residential program. By meeting the emotional needs of the youth, escalated behaviors, physical acting out and incidents of aggression are reduced resulting in enhanced safety and security. Counseling and therapy will be integrated into all components of the program and will specifically include: Informal Counseling conducted on an on-going basis by all staff, Individual

Counseling by a Masters level licensed therapist, Group Counseling by a Masters level, Licensed and CAC III Therapist and Milieu Management. The therapists (Treatment Coordinators) coordinate mental health services for the program and are available to provide emergency psychological service 24 hours a day, seven days a week. If additional psychological services are needed the Program Director will refer to the San Luis Valley Mental Health services or to Family Resources for further services. Our residential program has two therapists, a Masters level Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC) and a Masters Level Licensed Social Work (LCSW).

The Betty K. Marler Center is a secure residential treatment facility providing gender responsive services for forty adolescent female offenders committed to the Division of Youth Corrections. The female responsive philosophy includes self-esteem building, identity building, personal empowerment and the development of healthy relationships. Students attend school Monday through Friday from 8:20 am – 6:00 pm. Upon completion of enrollment, transcripts are evaluated and our young women are encouraged to pursue either the GED or High School Diploma track based on what is realistic and appropriate for their transitional needs. The young women attending school participate in content courses, physical education/athletics, technology and vocations (Applied Technology, Horticulture and Culinary Arts) as well as monthly multi-cultural awareness activities. Those students who already possess a High School Diploma or GED are encouraged to attend college via correspondence or on-line courses or participate in on-site work experiences. All of our young women are required to successfully complete baseline certification in CPR and 1st Aid, keyboarding and computer literacy, general OSHA and Serv-Safe, a food handling and sanitation certification.

Treatment Services:

The Betty K. Marler Center offers comprehensive, gender-specific, prescriptive treatment services that are individualized for each young woman enrolled in the program. The goal of the treatment program is to positively impact the young woman's thoughts and perceptions, emotional self-regulation, pro-social skills and behaviors. Each young woman receives individual therapy using the cognitive-behavioral model, family visitation and therapy and group therapies. Some of the therapeutic groups offered at Betty K. Marler include Substance Abuse Treatment and Education, Survivors of Sexual Abuse, Healthy Body Image, Domestic Violence Awareness, Victim Empathy, Healthy Sexuality and Grief and Loss. We also offer a Multi-Family Group to the families of the young women. Our young women also receive Psychiatric Evaluations and Medication Management on an as-needed basis. The Marler Center is an ADAD licensed facility. We have approximately twenty (20) young women participating in the Girls Enhanced Treatment and Transitional Drug and Alcohol Treatment Program. Young women enrolled in this program are placed on one of two dedicated housing units and receive Individual Substance Abuse Therapy and are enrolled in several groups related to treatment, trauma and relapse.

Program Overview:

For the female residential program, the curriculum is based on DBT, which focuses on needs specific to the profile of the clients in this program. This theory and approach to treatment was developed by Marsha Linehan in 1991. The goals of treatment include reducing para-suicidal (self-injuring) and life threatening behaviors, reducing behaviors that interfere with the therapeutic process, and reducing behaviors that reduced the client's quality of life. DBT believes that some people, due to negative environments during childhood and due to biological factors not yet known, react abnormally to emotional stimuli. Their arousal level goes up higher much more quickly, peaks at a higher level than others, and takes more time to return to a normal level. Because of the negative environment they grew up in, they don't have the methods of coping with sudden and intense surges of emotion. DBT is a method of teaching skills that will help. The following skills are taught: Interpersonal Effectiveness; Distress Tolerance; Reality Acceptance; Emotion Regulation; and Mindfulness. DBT helps those who have personal and environmental factors that often block and/or inhibit the use of behavioral skills that clients do have and reinforce dysfunctional behaviors.

Education Services:

Turning Point's education program is approved by the Colorado Department of Education and is designed to accommodate students with varying needs and who are learning at varying educational levels. We have a 1 to 10 teacher/student ratio. Licensed special education teachers, education counselors and numerous volunteers from the community, staff the classrooms. Our experienced school staff provides a structured program with line of sight supervision. We also receive federal funds that provide a Title 1 literacy teacher. The Title 1 program provides additional support through one-on-one direct instruction, for students who enter our education program 2 years or more below grade level in literacy.

Treatment Services:

MILIEU THERAPY: Described as the “life space” where a youth experiences therapy through daily living experiences. A behavior management system based upon teaching youth responsibility, honesty, integrity, cooperation and self-control through a consistent daily routine, confrontation and discipline is the cornerstone of the treatment program. This modality is crucial in addressing youth’s victimizing behaviors. The program’s confrontation system is designed to allow client’s to receive constant feedback from staff and peers on how their behavior effects others, those they live with, family and the community. Daily treatment assignments are designed to address these behaviors and belief systems that set the youth up for failure. Daily treatment assignments also teach alternative behaviors and choices to replace the dysfunctional ones.

INDIVIDUAL THERAPY: Each client will participate in this modality with their primary counselor (Bachelors level) for at least one hour per week and with their primary therapist (licensed or provisionally licensed) at least one hour per week. The therapeutic goal is to provide more insight and depth into a youth’s problems and strengths as it applies to his/her specific treatment plan and living experience.

GROUP THERAPY: Each client will participate in a minimum of three 60-minute therapy group sessions per week, facilitated by licensed or provisionally licensed therapists. These are structured “process groups” which allow youth to seek more insight and solutions toward issues through feedback, confrontation, disclosure and sharing experiences with the peer group. These groups are formatted to help youth model appropriate behavior, empathize with others, practice social skills, and learn to give and receive honest feedback and emotional support.

THERAPEUTIC RECREATION: Each client will participate in recreational therapy on a daily basis. This program is coordinated and supervised by a Masters level recreational specialist. The weekly recreational goals for a youth focus on helping him/her participate in an assigned activity; show respect for self and others; demonstrate responsible behavior; display cooperation and teamwork; learn to respect boundaries, property and equipment. This therapy affords the clients a chance to support peers and channel energy successfully through physical activities while having fun.

EMDR: A therapeutic process that has helped hundreds of thousands of people find relief from a wide range of emotional and personal problems. The client focuses on a selected event and the therapist helps the client center on him/herself witnessing the event. Next, bilateral stimulation with eye movements, or alternating taps or beeps, is begun. Periodically (every 10 seconds to 2 minutes), the therapist interrupts the bilateral stimulation to ask about the client’s current state and further guide the process. EMDR of the selected image or events ends when, after repeated rounds of viewing the image, the client is able to do so with a positively enhanced sense of her/himself. Several components are key: 1) The client must focus on something significant, an event or an image; 2) The client must center on him/herself while focusing on the image; and 3) Bilateral stimulation is essential. What clients experience during bilateral stimulation varies from client to client and from time to time. The outcome is that clients effectively reposition themselves with respect to the event and feel enhanced emotionally and cognitively.

EDUCATIONAL/LIFE SKILLS GROUPS: Each client will participate in 5-6 education groups per week for one hour each. These groups are facilitated by Bachelors level counselors and cover a wide range topics including: Anger Management, Communication, Conflict Resolution, Self-Esteem, Problem Solving, Cognitive Restructuring, Increasing Coping Skills, Healthy Relationships, Self-Ad Vocation, Decision Making, Stress Management, Life Skills, Transition, Cravings, Smoking Cessation, Experiential Exercises, etc. These groups are designed to help build additional coping/life skills that are going to be more functional and healthy for the client.

COLLABORATIVE THERAPY WITH COMMUNITY RESOURCES: When appropriate, clients have access to private psychotherapists to assist them in their work on traumatic experiences or an emotionally damaged past. In addition to psychotherapy, we work in collaboration with 3 licensed psychologists who assist in additional assessment and testing in order to clarify diagnosis, aid in treatment of a client, assess cognitive functioning, assess for learning disabilities, etc. These psychologists also work directly with the clinical team and teachers to assist in treatment planning and developing appropriate interventions.]

CASE MANAGEMENT: Each client will be assigned a case manager upon admittance to the program. Case Managers will oversee the client’s medical and dental needs; provide court transportation and follow through; provide the GAIN assessment and follow up assessments; provide communication with parents, Case Worker, GAL and Probation Officer; and participate in the development and updates of the client’s treatment plan.

JOB COACHING/JOB SEARCH SKILLS: Staff assist client through one-on-one instruction and through life skills groups in obtaining employment. Clients learn to write a resume, how to conduct themselves in a job interview, and how to complete job applications. Staff coach and mentor clients as they are searching for work within the community. Once a client does obtain employment, staff consistently monitor their job performance, attendance, punctuality and assist clients in managing their income to include savings and paying off restitution.

COMMUNITY SERVICE: All clients participate in community service while in any of our residential programs. Community service is how the clients ‘give back’ to the community. Examples of community service are: assisting at local races; working at the community gardens; Red Barn Project; Environmental Learning Center; etc.

Program Overview:

The male residential program is based on a cognitive/behavioral restructuring model and the Teaching Family Model. Cognitive rehabilitation has been a part of criminal justice for several decades. Recent works by Arnold Goldstein; Aaron Beck; Judith Beck; Ross, Fabiano & Ross; and the National Institute of Corrections have brought cognitive-behavioral structured skill development back into practice. It is almost universally recognized that part of the reason individuals commit criminal offenses is they lack requisite social skills; either they never learned the skills or learned skills which are counter-productive. These skill deficits must be identified and addressed if we are to successfully reduce the probability of the offender recidivating. Dr. Jim Tanner has developed and implemented a skill-building program to meet this need. Dr. Tanner developed Quickskills, which provides 12 modular skill-building courses. Clients are required to complete courses, which are indicated by the assessment process. The courses are carefully designed to help offenders remediate skill deficits. In addition, the boys residential program implements The Teaching Family Model, evidenced based best practice out of Omaha Boys Town. This model utilizes a teaching approach that builds on the youths' strengths. It provides practice and skill development in the moment, using real life situations. This model requires the development of a therapeutic relationship between staff and clients as well as guiding the client through a progressive increase in skill application.

Education Services:

Turning Point's education program is approved by the Colorado Department of Education and is designed to accommodate students with varying needs and who are learning at varying educational levels. We have a 1 to 10 teacher/student ratio. Licensed special education teachers, education counselors and numerous volunteers from the community, staff the classrooms. Our experienced school staff provides a structured program with line of sight supervision. We also receive federal funds that provide a Title 1 literacy teacher. The Title 1 program provides additional support through one-on-one direct instruction, for students who enter our education program 2 years or more below grade level in literacy.

Treatment Services:

MILIEU THERAPY: Described as the “life space” where a youth experiences therapy through daily living experiences. A behavior management system based upon teaching youth responsibility, honesty, integrity, cooperation and self-control through a consistent daily routine, confrontation and discipline is the cornerstone of the treatment program. This modality is crucial in addressing youth’s victimizing behaviors. The program’s confrontation system is designed to allow client’s to receive constant feedback from staff and peers on how their behavior effects others, those they live with, family and the community. Daily treatment assignments are designed to address these behaviors and belief systems that set the youth up for failure. Daily treatment assignments also teach alternative behaviors and choices to replace the dysfunctional ones.

INDIVIDUAL THERAPY: Each client will participate in this modality with their primary counselor (Bachelors level) for at least one hour per week and with their primary therapist (licensed or provisionally licensed) at least one hour per week. The therapeutic goal is to provide more insight and depth into a youth’s problems and strengths as it applies to his/her specific treatment plan and living experience.

GROUP THERAPY: Each client will participate in a minimum of three 60-minute therapy group sessions per week, facilitated by licensed or provisionally licensed therapists. These are structured “process groups” which allow youth to seek more insight and solutions toward issues through feedback, confrontation, disclosure and sharing experiences with the peer group. These groups are formatted to help youth model appropriate behavior, empathize with others, practice social skills, and learn to give and receive honest feedback and emotional support.

Synergy's TRCCF is for adolescent males with extensive substance use, conduct and other co-occurring disorders. The program is unlocked, highly structured, non-permissive, yet provides a nurturing environment. Average length of stay is 6 months. Clients successfully leaving this program and residing in the Denver area are eligible for aftercare services (Multi-Systemic Therapy Services, Relapse Prevention, Urinalysis and Incentives/Reinforces for continued abstinence), other step-down, transitional services (Day Treatment with MST, Outpatient) or grant funded Assertive Continuing Care. Animal-Assisted Therapy (AAT) is a goal-directed intervention in which an animal is an integral part of the treatment process. AAT is directed and/or delivered and documented by a health/human service professional with a specific clinical goal for a particular individual in mind. According to Animal-Assisted Therapy-Therapeutic Interventions, AAT is not a style of therapy, like cognitive therapy, behavioral therapy, etc.; instead, a therapist who utilizes AAT operates from their professional foundation and facilitates change in a client through the client's interactions with an animal. Physical therapists, occupational therapists, certified therapeutic recreation specialists, recreational therapists, teachers, social workers and others can incorporate AAT into their work and treatments in a multitude of ways. A therapy animal works in animal-assisted activities and animal-assisted therapy. It is usually the personal pet of its handler, and typically works with its handler in attendance during the sessions. Visiting animal-handler teams (such as those registered as Delta Society Pet Partners) are the most common source of therapy animals. The handlers of these visiting teams may be volunteers or healthcare professionals on the staff of the facility they visit. Healthcare professionals may find both benefits (i.e. not having to schedule a volunteer) and drawbacks (i.e. having to manage the client as well as the animal) when incorporating their own therapy animals into AAT sessions.

Face-to-face and phone contact with youth and their family. facilitation meetings.

Reflections for Youth's day treatment program operate out of a centralized location. Each of four classrooms employs a full-time special education teacher licensed as a Special Education Generalist meeting the needs of a highly qualified teacher as mandated by No Child Left Behind. Each classroom also employs a full-time bachelor's level paraprofessional with a substitute certification. The school program is overseen by Reflections' Educational Director and is licensed to serve a total of 40 youth (26 residential and 14 day treatment only). Day treatment students are expected to participate in a phase/level system similar to residentially placed students, follow classroom and program rules, adhere to an academic curriculum designed to give them the ability to meet their home district's graduation requirements, contribute to the writing and follow-through of their IEP or program-generated goals, and be willing to participate in individual, group and family therapy. Each day treatment student receives daily communication/behavior sheets completed by their teachers to be brought home and signed by parents or guardians for continued regular contact regarding student progress. It is the goal of Reflections for Youth's academic program to educate students in both a traditional and non-traditional manner by making certain each student receives core and elective classes needed to graduate, or by aiding in the attainment of a GED, and by offering community-based activities to enhance their learning experiences. In addition to an on-site computer lab, our schools utilize the local library/recreation center on a regular basis, participate in planned field trips designed to supplement classroom lessons, and are involved in service-learning opportunities as available. When GED attainment is the goal decided upon by youth and his/her staffing team, our educational staff arranges for he/she to take a GED locator test where their strengths and needs will be identified in relation to passing the GED, and then designs a daily educational plan incorporating core classes focused on those deficit areas with time built-in for regular and consistent studying. In addition, we are committed to assisting older students nearing discharge in locating appropriate community-based programs such as the Larimer County Workforce Center, Americorps and JobCorps, where career-exploration and job training/placement are further addressed. Day treatment students are required to participate in individual, group and family therapy unless contraindicated by the placement worker and/or school district referring the youth. The clinical services of the day treatment program are the overall responsibility of the Clinical Director in coordination with the Executive Director and therapist(s) providing the

services. This includes the development, implementation and coordination of the treatment program. Testing and psychiatric medication evaluations and appointments are conducted on an as-needed basis. These evaluations aid in case planning and assure that appropriate treatment is utilized for the youth's maximum growth and benefit. Our therapists are all at the master's level and have specific training in at least one of the following: EMDR; DBT; Cognitive Behavioral Therapy and/or Reactive Attachment Disorder. Psychiatric support services including Medication Management is provided for all day treatment youth on an as needed basis. Our clinical team evaluates each day treatment youth's plan twice monthly and treatment progress reports are submitted to the appropriate agencies representing the youth. Monthly (or as needed) staffings are scheduled to discuss the youth's progress in detail. A discharge plan and aftercare services are designed by the Clinical Director, Education Director, assigned therapist, guardian and placement worker.

Multidimensional Treatment Foster Care is a cost effective, evidenced-based alternative to group or residential treatment, incarceration and hospitalization for adolescents who have problems with chronic antisocial behavior, emotional disturbance and delinquency. Youth are placed, based on fit, in MTFC-trained foster homes with treatment and intensive supervision at home, in school and in the community; clear and consistent limits with follow-through on consequences; positive reinforcement for appropriate behavior; and separation from delinquent peers.

The intervention occurs in multiple settings:

The MTFC treatment team is lead by the Program Supervisor. The Program Supervisor reviews referrals and matches youth to the appropriate MTFC foster home and directs the implementation of the point and level system. The MTFC Foster Parents are highly trained in the model and implement a structured, individualized program for each child. A single youth is placed in each home.

The MTFC Individual Therapist provides individual therapy for the youth.

The Skills Trainer engages the youth in social skills building activities in the community.

The MTFC Family Therapist provides family therapy to the reunification family or identified caretakers. Families learn to provide consistent discipline, to supervise and to use a modified version of the behavior management system used in the MTFC home.

SAI Day Treatment – Clients receive day treatment services, including in-home family therapy and additional hours with an SAI Counselor, which include unannounced community monitoring, individual counseling sessions, assistance with offense specific material and recreational activities. Family members are asked to attend a weekly caretaker of offender group session which addresses offense-specific education and support. Clients also receive two offense-specific groups per week.

SAI Community Based Services – 1) Clients receive in-home and community based services which include in-home family therapy, unannounced community monitoring, individual counseling sessions, weekly offense specific groups, one weekly caretaker of offender groups, assistance with offense-specific material, independent living skills and recreational activities. 2) Clients receive in-home and community services similar to those described above, but at a less intensive level. The Client Manager and SAI Supervisor discuss which of the above services are priority for clients in this program. 3) Clients receive in-home and community services focused primarily on relapse prevention, safety contracts, clarification, individual or family therapy and informed supervision training for those in the client’s ecology who may provide supervision. This level targets clients who have completed a significant portion of offense specific treatment and does not include offense specific group treatment or caretakers’ group treatment. This level should be used in conjunction with Savio Transition Program services.

SAI Pre-Parole Clarification Services – This program is designed for clients who are being considered for return to a home in which their victim is residing. Prior to parole, clients and their families receive services to assist with preparing for and completing clarification. Parents attend the weekly caretaker of offender groups and individual therapy sessions are held with the client at this placement to prepare for the clarification session. After the client has completed the preparation process, in-home family meetings are held with the victim and identified support figures and clarification is completed at whatever location is identified to be ideal for the victim. Services are estimated to last 3 months and clients may be referred to the SAI Community Based Services Program following parole, when appropriate.

MST is strength based, family therapy that focuses on making use of positive community supports to create behavioral change. It is based out of Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) and Systems Theory and using a brief (90-150 days) intense (1-2 meetings/week & phone contact) intervention format to service families.

The UCH MST team specializes in clients that have co-morbid psychiatric issues, and can be better served by working with a psychiatrist and family therapist concurrently. The University of Colorado Hospital provides this entity within their MST program, in collaboration with the outpatient psychiatric clinic, at no cost to the client. Our MST clients have access to home based psychiatrists, as well as our outpatient clinic; to fully address mental health needs (i.e. psychiatric evaluations, medication management, after-care therapeutic services) that act as factors to sustaining pro-social behaviors.

The MST therapist provides intensive, home-based therapy, to clients and his/her families, with the goals of family preservation, academic/vocational success, sober living, pro-social associations, elimination of recidivism and mental health.

All MST therapists with the University of Colorado Hospital community based psychiatry team are Master leveled and clinically licensed (LCSW/LPC/LMFT) to provide mental health therapy.
