Committee Charge

Pursuant to Interim Committee Letter 2016-06, the committee is charged with studying the following policy issues:

- a general overview of the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA);
- transitioning Colorado from the requirements of the federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) and its associated waivers to the requirements of ESSA;
- additional indicators required or permitted by ESSA; and
- ESSA's impact on the statewide accountability system.

Committee Activities

The committee held three meetings during the 2016 interim. Briefings and presentations were made by representatives of the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL), the Colorado Department of Education (CDE), the State Board of Education, the Alliance for Excellent Education, the Data Quality Campaign, WestEd, the Fordham Institute, Achieve, and the Education Commission of the States on a wide range of subjects, including:

- requirements of ESSA;
- CDE activities;
- accountability and assessments under ESSA; and
- alignment of state and federal law.

The following sections discuss the committee's activities during the 2016 interim.

Requirements of ESSA

The committee heard expert testimony on the requirements of ESSA, how ESSA differs from NCLB, and the timeline given to states for implementation of ESSA. Representatives from NCSL provided testimony on how the new law will impact states; the elimination of the "highly qualified teacher" and "adequate yearly progress" metrics; the new prohibition on federal agencies controlling academic standards adopted by states or endorsing any particular curriculum; the new law's support for using Title I funds for science, technology, engineering, and math programs; grants provided under ESSA; and the federal process for rulemaking under the law. Representatives from Achieve and the Education Commission of the States presented information on the new nonacademic metrics to measure school quality that are required under ESSA, and provided examples of the types of metrics being considered.

CDE Activities

Representatives from CDE provided information to the committee on its progress creating the state plan as required under ESSA, including its creation of a hub-and-spoke committee structure to formulate portions of the state plan, and its schedule of community meetings to engage stakeholders. The Commissioner of Education spoke about the agency's stakeholder engagement process, the draft rules released in early summer 2016 by the U.S. Department of Education (department), and CDE's feedback to the department. CDE staff provided information about its participation in statewide assessments, the state's five-year accountability clock, ESSA's impact on statewide assessments in Colorado, the involvement of the State Board of Education, and the possibility of exceptions for advanced eighth grade math students.

Accountability and Assessments under ESSSA

Experts from several national organizations provided information to committee members on how accountability and assessment requirements are or are not changing under ESSA. A representative from the Alliance for Excellent Education spoke about growth gaps, opportunities for equity, and state approaches to addressing these problems, as well as ESSA's requirements for intervention in low-performing schools. A representative from the Data Quality Campaign spoke about the importance of quality data in making policy decisions and participation in statewide assessments.

Representatives from NCSL spoke about ESSA's increased flexibility for state assessments, despite the continuation of required assessments in grades 3 through 8 and once in high school, and how ESSA's required reporting of a summative score allows states and districts to break assessments down into separate parts to be given throughout the school year. Committee members heard testimony on the Innovative Assessment Pilot program available to states under ESSA. A representative from WestEd spoke about ESSA's areas of assessment flexibility, tiers of assessment, and proposed federal regulations. A representative from the Fordham Institute explained that organization's study of the relative value of specific assessments and presented findings related to the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) assessments.

Alignment of State and Federal Law

A representative of the Office of Legislative Legal Services (OLLS) gave a presentation about the areas of state law that may need to be aligned with ESSA, including assessment and accountability, English language learners, and educators, among others.

Summary of Recommendations

As a result of committee discussion and deliberation, the Interim Committee to Study the Every Student Succeeds Act did not recommend any bills for consideration during the 2017 legislative session.
