

Population

Population Estimates and Forecasts for the resident population are produced by the State Demography Office.

- Saguache County's population experienced steady growth from 1990 through 2003.
- Due to declines in employment in the mid-2000's, the population has remained relatively stable since.
- Recently, Saguache County gained 260 new residents since 2010, an almost 3% increase.




Population By Age

Saguache's population by age is shown in the chart to the right for both 2000 (blue bar) and 2010 (red bar). The 55 to 64 and 65 and older age groups are the only age groups experiencing significant growth last decade. Decreases in younger age groups are the result of lower levels of net in-migration of persons aged 30-40 than in previous decades. This also resulted in fewer families with children. The aging population may put downward pressure on local government tax revenue due to changes in spending on taxable goods.



Population By Age, Continued

Saguache County is forecast to reach 6,600 by 2020 and 7,100 by 2040. The forecast growth rate is expected to increase to an annual average growth rate of 0.8% per year from 2015 to 2030. The number of residents over age 70 is expected to increase, the result of current older residents aging in place. This aging will also result in declines in the 50-69 year old age group. Some of the growth is forecast for working age adults (20-50) as the need for replacement workers increases with retirements. The forecast growth will be dependent on housing and community services and how well Saguache attracts and retains its population.



- The overall vacancy rate was 31% in 2010.
- The majority of vacant units are for seasonal use (54.6%).
- Most of the units are owner occupied (68.7%) with a small rental market.
- Some of the vacant units may be uninhabitable.

- There was an increase in households between 2000 and 2010.
- This increase is almost entirely due to growth in Nonfamily households without children under 18 and non-family households living alone and those over the age of 65.
- This data is consistent with the aging of Saguache County residents.



- There has been growth in the White, Asian and Black population between 2000 and 2010.


Income

The graph below compares Saguache's income distribution to the state. Saguache has a lower median household income than the state, \$33,393 vs. \$60,629. Looking at the income distribution, there is a higher share of households with under \$60,000 in income compared to the state. The lower incomes reflect the large number of lower wage jobs. The income distribution is also influenced by the relatively small share of those with a Bachelor's Degree or higher.



Education

- Saguache County has a lower share of its population with a Bachelor's degree or higher compared to the state.
- The largest share of the population has some college or an Associate's degree.



Commuting

Commuting plays an important role in the economy of an area because not all workers live where they work. Commuting impacts local job growth, access to employees, and transportation infrastructure.

Saguache County has a larger workforce than it does jobs, however not all jobs are held by residents. Close to 66% of the resident workforce (light green) works outside of Saguache. Of the jobs in Saguache (dark green), 42% are filled by residents with 58% being filled by workforce from outside of the county.

Saguache County Commuting Patterns, 2014



Jobs & the Economy

Total employment in the county was estimated to be 2,681 in 2016, down 28 jobs from Saguache's peak employment in 2008 of 2,709. The industries with the largest loss in jobs in during and after the recession were agriculture, construction, government and financial activities. Since 2014 the most growth in jobs has been in government and admin and waste services. Industries above their prerecession peak include retail trade, accommodation and food, other services, and administration and waste.



Economic Base Analysis

The Base Industries chart shows which industries drive the economy in Saguache. The chart shows the important share of economic activity driven by agriculture and retirees. Retirees are a driver because they spend their savings or pensions locally. Commuters, regional services (like construction), and government transfer payments are also important economic drivers to the county.

Average Wage Trends

- Average weekly wages in Saguache increased by 13.8% between 2010 and 2016 compared to the state, which increased by 14.3%.
- Weekly wages of \$589 in Saguache in 2016 were 44% lower than the \$1,052 statewide average.
- Wages in Saguache increased by 2.9% between 2015 and 2016, while statewide wages increased by 1.0%. Due to its smaller employment base, average wage change in Saguache is much more volatile than statewide.



Population and Economic Forecast

The rates of growth of both population and jobs can differ somewhat because of changes in the labor market, i.e., labor force participation rates, age, unemployment rates, multiple job holding, and/or commuting. In addition, macroeconomic conditions such as business cycle fluctuations and faster or slower periods of U.S. and Colorado economic growth can affect overall job growth in a region.

- Job growth is expected to exceed population growth through 2020.
- After 2020, population growth is forecast to exceed job growth.
- This is driven in part by the aging of the population and the labor force in particular. Population growth occurs as people move into jobs vacated when a person ages out of the labor force. This drives population growth, but not necessarily new jobs.
- Although employment isn't expected to be growing after 2025, the population will. This may require additional housing and community services. Additionally, an aging population may require increased need for accessible housing and other aging services.
