

THE FOUNDATION LAUNCHES FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN FOR THE COLORADO DIVISION OF WILDLIFE LYNX RESTORATION PROJECT

2005 saw the Foundation reach beyond the half-way mark in their campaign goal to raise \$600,000. Over \$337,000 in donations and pledges continue to flow in since the August, 2004 kick off. The funds raised will go to support the Colorado Division of Wildlife Lynx Restoration Project initiated in 1999 with the release of Canada Lynx, once native to Colorado. There is continued need for funds to further research lynx reproduction. This is one of the most essential components to understand in creating a sustainable lynx population in the future.

Since 1999, the Colorado Division of Wildlife (CDOW) has released 204 lynx. During May-June 2005, CDOW identified 17 dens and found a total of 50 kittens and documented 23 possible mating pairs of lynx during the breeding season.

Other Notable Grants:

- 7 Colorado School Habitat Grants each for \$1,000 in 2005 over \$100K since 1990 expended for this project.
- The Interpretive Sign Project \$2,500 Grant to educate the public and protect critical Elk winter Range.

Owl Mountain Partnership:

After 11 years and over \$2million raised for habitat improvement in Walden, CWHF helps Owl Mountain Partnership - become its own 501 © 3 non-profit organization.

Kizer Memorial Fund


Awarded \$5700 this year to stock fish for Kids angler education, equaling just over \$16,000 in the last two years.


River Ranch Conservation Easement

165 acres just south of Grand Junction has been conserved for wildlife in perpetuity thanks to Lammont DuPont. This property is beautifully nestled along the Colorado River providing habitat for an array of waterfowl species and more. *
