

### Colorado Cares about... Community Service



Eleven volunteers cleaned-up the grounds, trimmed bushes and shrubs, lawns and hedges of the Dominican Sisters Home Health Agency of Denver.

The Corporation for National and Community Service Colorado State Office, working with the Colorado AmeriCorps Alumni Association and the Arc Thrift Store Warehouse, facilitated the donation of approximately 100 adult general reading books and about 1200 children's books to Volunteers of America RSVP and Eaton Terrace Senior Programs.



Seventy-five volunteers helped with morning registration, aid support stations, and at the post-party at the Colorado-Eagle River Ride bike event. The 100-mile road bike ride is the largest fundraising event of the year for SOS Outreach.

United Way of Larimer County's Volunteer Center coordinated the "Summer Day of Service." The volunteers served at Neighbor to Neighbor, an affordable housing organization in Fort Collins. They helped to paint a picket fence of a new community garden for residents, as well as worked to clear debris from a pond that will be turned into a recreation area for families.



#### Colorado Cares about... Health



Volunteers representing Hewlett Packard, Avago Technologies and United Way helped by sorting through a large storage shed and inventoried the contents. These volunteers helped Angel House agency. After completing their service they enjoyed a tour and an overview of the agency's mission, goals and programs.





As part of the statewide Colorado Cares Day, the Westminster Stake of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints organized a food drive to help replenish the shelves of FISH, a Broomfield organization that helps needy families in the Broomfield and Westminster areas.



They were welcomed by Broomfield Mayor Pat Quinn, Westminster Stake President Larry Hickman, and Shirley McGinnis who is the director of FISH. Over 3418 pounds were donated to FISH on Saturday, July 26<sup>th</sup>. Over 350 volunteers participated in the project, donating approximately 800 hours of service.



### Colorado Cares about... Public-Private Partnerships





Thanks to volunteers the HomaAid Discovery Home was painted and landscaped.



This project was sponsored by Wells Fargo Bank, along with Denver Children's Home.





Over 900 tons of gravel, donated by Western Summit Constructors, were moved into place in one day by 1000 volunteers from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints.

The gravel was used to create a 5k trail at the Aurora Reservoir. The new public trail,

certified by the U.S. Track and Field Association, will also be used for triathlons and other events expected to draw participants from around the country.





Volunteers from four churches in Highlands Ranch and Roxborough helped with the third annual Interfaith Community Food Drive.

These 475 volunteers collected 21,500 pounds of food and other household items for the Interfaith Community Service.

#### Colorado Cares about... The Environment

The Mile High Youth Corps divided its volunteers into two teams: The Red Rocks Team and the Bluff Lake Team.



#### Bluff Lake Team:

Thirty-three volunteers helped refine 300 feet of trail with crusher fine, they also laid out boulders to define the trail. This team also secured a 250 foot long boardwalk by re-bolting 116 handrail post.

#### Red Rocks Team:

Composed of 18 volunteers, the team covered 800 feet of trail with crusher fine for Red Rocks Elementary School. The trail will serve as a path for different outdoor education learning stations.



Volunteers helped with a community improvement project in the Lanyon Park neighborhood of Longmont. They cleaned alleyways and parks, removed trash, weeds, eradicated graffiti, and planted flowers. There was a barbeque with community residents and volunteers following the cleanup.



#### Colorado Cares about... Youth Development

Kid Spree provided thousands of children with a fun-filled day of hands-on activities. Volunteers painted a tiny tot town every color under the rainbow. Also, they created a party hat fit for a king or gueen.

Members of the Columbine Stake of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-days Saints assembled basic school supplies into kits that will help 1,600 low-income children in South Jefferson County elementary schools.

It is my pleasure to present the 2008 Colorado Cares Day Report on behalf of the staff of the Governor's Commission on Community Service. 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the statewide day of service marks a special milestone this report has a very special meaning to the commissioners and staff members.

Colorado has a very long history of volunteerism and community service. We are a leader in service not only for this region, but also for the entire country.

- Colorado ranks 8th in the US for the rate of volunteer service performed by college students as nearly 40% of college students in Colorado serve their communities.
- The state is 16th among states in the volunteer rate of adults aged 65 and older with 27% of Coloradoans aged 65 and over serving their communities.
- We rank 18th among states in the average volunteer hours per resident per year.
- On average, Colorado's 1.2 million volunteers dedicate 160.7 millions hours of service per year. This equates to an estimated \$3.1 billion economic contribution back to the state.\*

As the Governor's Commission on Community Service continues to carry out its mission to promote volunteerism, I'd like to thank all of you who participated in this year's event, and encourage you and others to continue supporting community service in your state. We hope to see you at next year's Colorado Cares Day!
