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Overview

Overview of UCDHSC

A premier research university

The University of Colorado at Denver and Health Sciences Center (UCDHSC) is Colorado's premier research university.

The origins of this major institution began in 1883 with the creation of a medical department (consisting of two students and two senior faculty) by the University of Colorado. The School of Nursing was added in 1898. The School of Pharmacy was added in 1913, and the medical center at Ninth and Colorado was dedicated in 1925.

The downtown campus originated as an extension of the University of Colorado at Boulder in 1912, becoming a separate institution in 1972. In 2004, the University of Colorado at Denver combined with the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center.

The university is currently found at three different locations:

- downtown Denver on the Auraria campus (DDC), with liberal arts and sciences and professional programs in seven schools and colleges
- at Ninth Ave. and Colorado Blvd., now in the process of relocating, with five professional schools in the health sciences arena and portions of University of Colorado Hospital (UCH)
- at the Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora, eventual home for all health sciences units, extensive research and education facilities and university hospital patient care buildings

Downtown campus culture reflects a history of service to upper division and graduate students. Downtown students have historically been older than the traditional 18-to-21-year-old student. They are generally working at least part-time (and many full-time) and have a dependent at home. Because the downtown student has a full life with competing obligations, faculty and staff have provided flexible programs and schedules.

The addition of residential housing adjacent to the Auraria campus has provided a significant infusion of attention and focus to the lower division undergraduate student.

The downtown location offers convenient access to businesses, organizations and government offices. Internships and class projects "in the field" enable students to gain hands-on, practical experience to complement their classroom learning.

Health sciences programs are highly selective. Clinical and research components are significant drivers of the university budget and economic impact.

The extensive new medical and research facilities under construction at the Anschutz Medical Campus provide a cutting-edge environment for studies, patient care and research. When this development is complete, including the university programs as well as some affiliated hospitals and independent bioscience companies, it will be the most substantial health and research enterprise in the Rocky Mountain region.

A priority on diversity and inclusion

The university places a high priority on strengthening diversity and inclusion in its student and faculty programs.

The greatest diversity at UCDHSC is found among staff and administrators, who are 27 percent minority and 64 percent female. Every faculty category has in the last year showed a slight increase in faculty-of-color representation.

Compared to Colorado's research universities, UCDHSC has the most diverse student population, with 27 percent undergraduate students of color, 13 percent of graduate students and 21 percent of first professional students. Since fall 2005, enrollment for students of color has increased seven percent. Five-year growth rates show the greatest increase came among Hispanic/Latino(a) populations, at 16 percent growth overall and 32 percent for undergraduates. International students comprise three percent of the total student population.

- The university employs 2,610 distinguished faculty, who hold national and international honors and awards and serve on national boards.
- The university awards more graduate degrees than any other Colorado institution.
- UCDHSC FY 2006 expenditures include \$859,553,410, with just nine percent from state appropriations. The remainder comes from tuition and fees; gifts, grants and contracts; auxiliary funds; and other unrestricted funds. The university enterprise contributes substantially to Colorado's economy, through employment, purchase of goods and services and consumer spending by faculty, staff and students.

The state's only architecture school offers undergraduate programs for 830 students on the Boulder campus and graduate programs for nearly 500 students in Denver. Programs are accredited by the Landscape Architecture Accreditation Board (LAAB), National Architecture Accrediting Board (NAAB) and Planning Accreditation Board (PAB).

As one of the country's largest colleges of architecture and related design and planning disciplines, the college is able to create a number of communities of interest across the disciplines, bringing together faculty, students and practitioners and building synergistic relationships. These communities of interest are creating areas of prominence and distinction for the college and include:

Supporting these communities are centers that offer field experience:

- Center for Emerging Practices in Design exploring new design practices and technologies

Students and faculty collaborate to develop productive relationships. The mentoring program was named one of three Best Practices in Mentor-

ship nationally, by the American Institute of Architects in 2005.

College of Architecture and Planning students joined with architectural engineering students to design and build solar powered houses that won the first two national Department of Energy Solar Decathlon Competitions, held in 2002 and 2005.

College students record, produce and distribute original albums on the CAM Records label. **The Fray**, now enjoying international acclaim and nominated for two Grammy awards, recorded on the CAM label while they were students at the college.

CAM students use the King Academic & Performing Arts Center, a complex that is home to a concert hall, courtyard theatre and recital hall, recording studio and practice rooms.

David Liban, assistant professor of theatre, film and video production, provides students many opportunities to participate in his award-winning documentary films. Denver's lively arts community gives students multiple opportunities to experience and participate in the visual and performing arts.

A CAM faculty member directs the National Center for Audio/Video Forensics. The Starz FilmCenter, a multiplex on campus managed for CAM by the Denver Film Society, provides a wider daily screening of non-commercial film titles than can be found at any other university.

The college provides education for both undergraduate and graduate students, enrolling more than 500 undergraduates and more than 300 graduate students. The majority of students join Colorado industries when they graduate. Many students are already working in local businesses while pursuing their education. The college's mission is to help students succeed in the workplace and build their professional careers. All four undergraduate degree programs are accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology.

Students choose their specialization from four disciplines: civil engineering, computer science and engineering, electrical engineering, and mechanical engineering. The college emphasizes integrating foundational knowledge and skills with real-world application. Through hands-on experience in laboratories and on projects, students develop their capabilities in problem solving, research, communications and teamwork. Opportunities abound for students to learn skills such as measuring particles in water, modeling traffic patterns, assessing bridges and roads of the City and County of Denver, developing computer animation and

simulation programs, engineering communication and computer networks, measuring at nanoscale using an atomic force microscope, fabricating electronic devices, building autonomous vehicles and race cars, and studying cell growth of plants. Engineering industries are increasingly global. Students experience multicultural aspects of engineering and technology. The college's faculty and students have traveled to rural India, working with local communities on wind power projects.

College alumni are an important part of many Colorado industrial sectors. They include design/build and construction, transportation, energy and power, aerospace, communications, computers, software, manufacturing, biotechnology, instrumentation and controls and many others. A number of graduates have gone on to other career paths such as law, education and medicine.



Designated as Colorado's only Graduate School of Public Affairs (GSPA), alumni make a significant impact on the policy and programs of the state and region. The school offers programs at the downtown Denver campus and at the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs with options at the Western Slope and online.

Enrollment in Denver is more than 300; in Colorado Springs, it is more than 100 students. The school is in the process of adding a bachelor's degree in criminal justice, bringing in its first undergraduate students. It is accredited by the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Administration (NASPAA).

Ranked by *US News & World Report*, the school is among the country's top 10 public urban universities offering the MPA. GSPA offers the country's only federally-funded domestic violence program and PhD concentration in homeland security.

The school is distinguished as one of only two programs nationally to partner with the U.S. Office of Personnel Management to provide Executive MPA students the opportunity to participate in management development centers.

In this nationally recognized, award-winning school, students graduate with the ability to offer a broad range of dental services.

The School of Dentistry is one of the most selective in the U.S., with more than 1,300 applicants annually for only 50 positions in the DDS program, and nearly 2,400 applicants for the International Dental Student program, which annually accepts 20 students. The school offers the only BS in dental hygiene in the state of Colorado. Post-doctoral residencies are available in general practice, orthodontics and periodontics.

Today, the School of Dentistry enrolls more than 330 students in its various degree granting and professional certificate programs.

All dental students provide an academic year's dental clinical care to underserved populations throughout Colorado, a requirement for graduation. Home to the region's only university-based dental implant center, the school pioneers research in oral cancer, salivary gland disease, neurobiology and pain control.

The school's collaborative research programs attract significant NIH/NIDCR funding and involve scientists in research with the School of Medicine and Cancer Center, in addition to bioengineering programs within the University of Colorado at Boulder College of Engineering and The Children's Hospital. In 2005, the School of Dentistry ranked 17th out of all U.S. dental schools in NIH funding.

Additionally, the school's patient care/community service programs have served as a national model for community-based clinical education and provide a safety-net for Colorado's uninsured and underinsured families. This year, in collaboration with the School of Medicine, a rural track DDS program was started.

Over three decades, the school has witnessed unprecedented growth and progress. Today this research-intensive, comprehensive dental school features internationally recognized educational, research and clinical programs powered by an outstanding faculty, a service-oriented staff and exceptional students.

The state's largest graduate school of education serves approximately 1,300 degree/licensure-seeking students each fall and serves annually more than 2,200 degree/licensure-seeking students with another 4,000 in continuing education options. It is consistently ranked by *US News & World Report* as one of the best education programs in the country, reaching #70 in America's Best Graduate Schools, 2007 edition.

Fifty full-time faculty members along with 75 part-time faculty teach in undergraduate, post-baccalaureate and graduate teacher education as well as 10 graduate degree programs for educators and mental health providers at the master's, educational specialist and doctoral levels. These programs result in 13 types of licensure or endorsement.

A network of partnerships with Denver Public Schools and a number of the other largest metro districts enables students to gain the experience they need to succeed in any classroom. Coursework is relevant and gives students a practical foundation to support teaching skills.

Faculty conduct substantial unfunded research, much of it focused on diversity and equity issues. Faculty also currently hold \$38 million in grants, equivalent to about \$8 million per year. Federal grants fund centers responsible for significant national direction in research and policy in urban school improvement, the training of paraprofessionals and several areas of special education, including autism, early childhood special education and overidentification of students with special needs.

The school is accredited by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE), Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP) and National Association of School Psychologists (NASP).

With nearly 750 doctor of medicine and doctor of physical therapy students, the School of Medicine (SOM) is nationally and internationally known for programs of excellence in education, research, patient care and community service. Its MD program is accredited by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME).

Faculty serve as clinical experts and are physicians at University of Colorado Hospital, National Jewish Medical and Research Center, The Children's Hospital, Denver Health Medical Center and the Veterans Administration Medical Center.

Together with affiliated hospital partners, SOM faculty rank fourth out of 75 public medical schools in the country for National Institutes of Health (NIH) research expenditures; fifteenth among all medical schools (125 total). More than 415 faculty physicians are ranked as Best Doctors in America. Five faculty are members of the National Academy of Sciences, and 13 are in the Institute of Medicine.

Ranked 15th in the nation in overall excellence, the pace-setting School of Nursing enrolls nearly 800 undergraduate and graduate students. The foundation of academic degree programs is theoryguided, evidence-based nursing practice. The philosophy that drives the school—knowledge of human responses and natural healing processes balances technological advances and biomedical treatments and cures—shapes its curriculum.

The school was founded in 1898. The bachelor's program was established in 1920. The school instituted the first nurse practitioner and school nurse programs in the United States. The doctor of nursing practice program (formerly the nursing doctorate program) was established in 1990 and is one of just four in the United States, the first to be located in a public university. The PhD program is one of the oldest research doctoral programs in the west, established in 1978 and widely recognized for faculty mentoring and innovative models of program delivery. The School of Nursing is fully accredited by the National League for Nursing (NLN) and the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE).

The School of Pharmacy is one of the top-ranked pharmacy schools in the nation, enrolling more than 800 professional and graduate students. Committed to pharmaceutical education, research and patient care, the school educates students in the properties of medicinal agents, the biology of disease, the pharmacological and toxicological actions of drugs and the current best practices for clinical and therapeutic uses of drugs. Students engage in experiential learning at sites across Colorado. Continuing education programs are offered to pharmacists and other health practitioners throughout the state.

US News & World Report ranks the PharmD program as 23rd nationally.

Consistently among the top ten U.S. pharmacy schools in federal research funding, the school's internationally renowned faculty conduct pioneering basic, translational and clinical research in a variety of scientific fields such as pharmaceutical biotechnology and biophysics, drug development, pharmacokinetics, pharmacogenomics, molecular toxicology, clinical therapeutics and health outcomes. Specialized focus areas include cancer, diabetes,

A \$10 million gift from The ALSAM Foundation will enable the school to be renamed the Skaggs School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences and to move into a new clinical and research facility at the Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora.

Pharmacy postgraduate training offers the following residencies in general pharmacy practice, ambulatory care-family medicine, critical care, infectious diseases and oncology, and fellowship programs in HIV/AIDS and critical care/infectious diseases. All residencies are accredited by the American Society of Health-Systems Pharmacists (ASHP), the nation's primary accrediting body for pharmacy postgraduate training programs.

Minority Persistence and Graduation Rates

While the university does a good job of attracting and retaining first-time freshman minorities to the second fall, the university's record for graduating those undergraduate minorities has not been as successful. In the most recent fall-to-fall retention rate for first-time freshmen, 71 percent of both minorities and whites were enrolled in the second fall. In the most recent published graduation cohort analysis, however, only 38 percent of minorities graduated in six-years compared to 46 percent of the Caucasian students.





Use of Financial Aid at HSC FY 2006








Downtown Denver Campus FY 2006 Actual Expenditures Total \$147,740,669




Health Sciences Center FY 2006 Actual Expenditures Total \$711,812,741

Health Sciences Center Sources of Revenue




Economic Contributions of UCDHSC to Colorado's Economy, Fiscal Year 2005

UCDHSC faculty and staff and affiliated University Physicians Inc. staff totaled nearly 9,100 employees in fiscal year 2005.

Institutional purchases of goods and services, research subcontracts to Colorado firms, and consumer spending by faculty, staff and students indirectly supported as many as 10,624 jobs in Colorado.

Institutional and student spending directly and indirectly supported about 19,704 jobs in Colorado in fiscal year 2005.



UCDHSC Contributions to Statewide Personal Income

UCDHSC operations and associated student spending supported total personal income of nearly \$973 million in Colorado in fiscal year 2005.

More than \$580 million of the total represented the direct payroll of faculty and staff employed by UCDHSC. An additional \$392 million in earnings and non-wage income was realized as a result of the indirect and induced effects of the direct effects.

As a result of the concentration of direct jobs in health care and higher education, the average income for all jobs supported by UCDHSC exceeded \$45,000 in fiscal year 2005.
