A remarkable research university

The University of Colorado Denver (UC Denver) is the state's number one research funded university, offering comprehensive programs for undergraduate, graduate and health sciences students on two campuses—in Denver and on the Anschutz Medical Campus in Aurora—and in centers and institutes across the state. UC Denver faculty and researchers are the foundation of the reputation for discovery and innovation characteristic of the University of Colorado.

- 132 degree programs in 13 schools and colleges (FY10)
- collaborative degree programs that prepare graduates to meet tomorrow's challenges
- more than \$421 million in sponsored research awards, breaking ground in a number of areas, from advancing cancer treatments to creating more sustainable urban infrastructures and better public schools

- educates students on two campuses, online and in programs and centers across the state of Colorado
- UC Denver receives less than 9 percent of total revenues from state appropriations
- students come from 50 states and 134 countries (FY10)
- awards more graduate degrees than any other Colorado institution

The origins of the current UC Denver began in Boulder in 1883 with the creation of a medical department (two students and two senior faculty). The College of Nursing was established in 1898. The School of Pharmacy was established in 1911. In 1912, the University of Colorado at Boulder created an extension in Denver. In 1972, the University of Colorado at Denver was created, one of three institutions occupying the Auraria Campus downtown. In 2004, the downtown entity consolidated with the University of Colorado Health Sciences Center, and in 2006, the university declared its official name as the University of Colorado Denver with two campus locations.

Programs are accredited by the Landscape Architectural Accreditation Board (LAAB), National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB) and Planning Accreditation Board (PAB).

As one of the country's largest colleges of architecture and related design and planning disciplines, the college is able to create a number of communities of interest across the disciplines, bringing together faculty, students and practitioners and building synergistic relationships. These communities of interest are creating areas of prominence and distinction for the college and include:

More than 1,200 students in the College of Arts & Media (CAM) are immersed in a challenging, rewarding, supportive and rich learning environment that focuses on the intersection of art, the creative industries and emerging technology. CAM students change and grow through classes and practicing art every day as they prepare for lifetimes of influencing and changing society through art.

CAM film and theatre students use up-to-date professional equipment and facilities, postproduction laboratories and the Kenneth Kendall King Academic and Performing Arts Center, which houses a 500-seat concert hall, a 300-seat flexible form theatre and a 200-seat recital hall as well as production shops, production studio and a recording studio.

Digital art creation and the convergence of classic and new technologies challenge visual arts students. Program instruction in 3-D animation, digital design and transmedia, as well as painting, drawing, art history, photography and sculpture encourages students to push the limits of emerging and traditional art forms.

Music industry studies offers a nontraditional music education that focuses on the entertainment business and creative industries, including popular and commercial performance, music business and entrepreneurship and recording arts. The MS in recording arts includes study in media forensics, the preparation of teachers of recording arts and cutting-edge postproduction techniques. Students use specially-built facilities with recording studios, computer-formusic laboratories and rehearsal rooms for individual artists and ensembles.

CAM faculty are distinguished by their commitment to teaching undergraduate students and a small number of graduate students. Not only do many have prestigious degrees and academic records, they are noted artists in their fields, regularly performing and exhibiting their works across the United States and around the globe.

The college benefits from the proximity of the Denver Performing Arts Complex, the Denver Art Museum and a multitude of performance and gallery venues in downtown Denver. The Starz Denver FilmCenter, which shows films year round and is home to the Starz Denver Film Festival, is located on campus. Denver's position as center of the Rocky Mountain West provides a launching pad for international study programs abroad and attracts international students.

School of Dental Medicine

Dean: Denise Kassebaum, DDS, MS

Today, this research-intensive, comprehensive dental school increases access to innovative education programs, life-improving research and excellent clinical care programs that enhance oral and systemic health. The School of Dental Medicine (SDM) is home to a DDS program, an international dental program, a general practice residency and advanced dental education (residency) programs in periodontics and orthodontics in which enrollees may obtain postdoctoral master's degrees.

The SDM's DDS program is one of the most selective in the United States, with more than 1,400 applicants annually for only 52 positions in the DDS program and nearly 350 applicants for the international student program, which annually accepts 40 students.

Its education programs are evidence-based, interprofessional and teach students to treat patients of all ages as members of a health care team. The school's collaborative research programs have focus areas in cancer biology, craniofacial developmental biology and dental materials and bioengineering. The dental scientists collaborate with the CU Cancer Center, the CU School of Medicine

and the CU Boulder College of Engineering on funded research projects. In 2009, the school ranked 19 out of 58 dental schools in National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research (NIDCR) funding (only 47 schools received measurable funding). Dental medicine faculty's collaborative research with other university faculty ranks UC Denver 12th for NIDCR funding.

The SDM has a long commitment to increasing access to care for disadvantaged populations. Its community-based education program serves as a national model for service learning in dental education. Students provide care in clinics around the state as well as on the school's Mobile Dental Clinic. Rural and global health tracks are available for students to participate in.

The educational programs of the SDM are nationally recognized for their quality and are accreditated by the American Dental Association.

Colorado's largest graduate school of education serves more than 2,300 degree/licensure students annually, with another 6,400 in continuing education options. The school prepares and inspires education and mental health leaders to have a profound impact in fostering student opportunity, achievement and success in urban and diverse communities. Areas of study include programs for new teachers, experienced teachers, school administrators, counselors, school psychologists, school librarians, as well as technology and research professionals.

The school has 66 full-time faculty members along with 113 parttime faculty who teach undergraduate, graduate and doctoral-level courses. Faculty members are backed by \$20 million in faculty and research grants. Faculty research focuses on issues of diversity and equity in education, math education, assessment in education and counseling in urban school and communities. provide education and training to people across the country and collaborate with professional organizations and local communities.

The school's newly designed urban teacher education program answers the call from metro Denver districts for new teachers who can ensure K-12 student success in increasingly diverse classrooms. The program is a national model for teacher preparation, taking place in a citywide laboratory in which faculty and teacher candidates partner with professional development schools, community agencies and educational organizations to address challenges by building on the assets of urban community knowledge.

The school has an extensive network of alumni who are leaders in the surrounding Denver metro area school districts and counseling offices.

The school is accredited by the Colorado Department of Education, the Colorado Department of Higher Education, the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs, and the National Association of School Psychologists.

The College of Engineering and Applied Science provides education for both undergraduate and graduate students, enrolling more than 550 undergraduates and more than 350 graduate students. The majority of students join Colorado industries when they graduate. Many students are already working in local businesses while pursuing their education. The college's mission is to help students succeed in the workplace and build their professional careers by providing an accessible education. All four undergraduate degree programs are accredited by the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, also known as ABET.

Students choose their specialization from five disciplines: bioengineering, civil engineering, computer science and engineering, electrical engineering and mechanical engineering. The college emphasizes integrating foundational knowledge and skills with real-world application. Through hands-on experience, students develop their capabilities in problem solving, research and teamwork. Students have many opportunities to learn skills such as measuring particles in water, modeling traffic patterns, assessing bridges and roads, developing computer animation and simulation

Bioengineering graduate students apply engineering principles and techniques to medical and biological fields, providing improvements in people's lives through devices such as artificial hands and heart valves and techniques such as medical imaging for diagnostics.

Nearly 140 international students seeking various engineering degrees are currently enrolled. Students experience multicultural aspects of engineering and technology.

College alumni are an important part of many Colorado industrial sectors, including transportation, energy and power, construction, fluid mechanics, aerospace, computer graphics, hydrology, bioengineering, communications, computer networks, structural and earthquake engineering, biophotonics, geographic information systems, manufacturing, sustainability, concrete materials, tribology, instrumentation and control systems, and environmental engineering. Additionally, a number of graduates have gone on to other career paths such as law, education and medicine.

With nearly 800 doctor of medicine, physician assistant and doctor of physical therapy students, the School of Medicine (SOM) offers programs that are nationally and internationally known for their excellence in education, research, patient care and community service. The school's MD program is accredited by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME).

Faculty serve as clinical experts and physicians at University of Colorado Hospital, The Children's Hospital of Denver, National Jewish Health, Denver Health Medical Center and the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Denver.

SOM faculty rank sixth among public medical schools in the country for federal research grants and contracts and 18th among all public and private medical schools, according to the Association of American Medical Colleges. Four faculty are members of the National Academy of Sciences, and 14 are in the Institute of Medicine.

The College of Nursing enrolls more than 700 students. Founded in 1898, the college began Colorado's first baccalaureate program and has offered graduate education since 1950. The baccalaureate curriculum prepares transformational nurse clinicians who promote excellence in patient safety and quality health care through inquiry, reflection and accountability. The college recently partnered with Community College of Aurora to create an integrated pathway program to increase access for community college students to the undergraduate program, the first such program in Colorado.

The master's program educates advanced practice nurses, specialists in health care informatics and nursing leadership health systems and administers a graduate-level post-master's certificate program. The college established the first nurse practitioner and first school nurse programs in the United States.

The DNP program educates nurses for the highest level of nursing practice and is the terminal clinical degree in nursing. Graduates are clinical leaders who design models of health care delivery, evaluate clinical outcomes, identify and manage health care needs of populations and use technology and information to transform health care systems.

The research doctoral program creates knowledge for reflective, theory-guided and research-based nursing practice. The innovative, distance-accessible curriculum educates nurse scientists to lead research in health care delivery systems and biobehavioral science.





Student Diversity

Diversity is at the heart of the University of Colorado Denver's mission, vision and value statements, driving its success in reaching the people and communities it serves.

Much of the successful recruitment and enrollment of diverse students at the Denver Campus is the result of strong preschool-20 (P-20) partnerships, the development of precollegiate preparation programs and outreach initiatives such as the Denver Transfer Initiative Title V grant, recent collaborations with Aurora Public Schools and the oncampus residential facility (Campus Village Apartments).

At the Denver Campus, first-generation students make up 38 percent of the total undergraduate (UG) enrollment. The proportion of UG students of color at UC Denver has increased each year since 2005, with a high of 28.9 percent for fall 2009.

Over the last four years, the percent of health professional students of color has remained steady at about 21 percent. Although national competition is intense, UC Denver is developing and implementing strategies to attract medical students of color.









Impacts on State Employment

UC Denver faculty, residents, staff and student workers on both the Denver and Anschutz campuses (including the affiliated University Physicians, Inc.) totaled 10,298 jobs in FY 2010.

Institutional purchases of goods and services, research subcontracts with Colorado firms, and consumer spending by faculty, staff and students indirectly supported as many as 13,824 jobs in Colorado.

Institutional and student spending directly and indirectly supported over 24,000 jobs in Colorado in fiscal year 2010.

Contributions of UC Denver to Colorado Economy, Fiscal Year 2010


Impacts on State Personal Income

UC Denver operations and student spending supported nearly \$1.43 billion in state personal income in FY 2010.

More than \$849 million of the total represented the direct payroll of university faculty, medical residents, staff, student workers and University Physicians, Inc. \$580 million in additional earnings was realized as a result of the indirect and induced effects of direct payroll and student spending.

Due to the concentration of direct jobs in health care and higher education, the average income for jobs supported by the university was more than \$59,000 in FY 2010.
